Agriculture is the dominant profession of this country, and this eastern part of UP has particularly an agriculture based economy. Our founding fathers well recognized this aspect, and as a result, agriculture is one of the oldest and richest faculties of this institution. It runs almost all courses coming in the purview of agriculture, from graduation to Ph.D. level. Apart from this, the college runs a broad spectrum of traditional courses in other disciplines like Science, Arts, Commerce and B.Ed. The institution charts out a proper planning and schedule to conduct both theoretical as well as practical

classes in all of its courses. To keep pace with time, we have introduced courses like UG and PG in Biotechnology, masters degree in Commerce, masters degree in Chemistry as well as agricultural chemistry. Our teachers receive all kind of moral and financial supports for effectively delivering the curriculum to the students. The management provides all possible help in equipping the laboratories as well as libraries to help teachers implement the curriculum. The management also encourages the faculties to attend various orientation and refresher courses from time to time, which helps the faculty to equip themselves with latest developments in their subjects. We have a Wi-Fi campus and most of the departments are now having IT facilities to improve their teaching and learning practices. We make all efforts to properly document the admission records, attendance in theory and practical classes, record of internal evaluation test wherever required and examination results and records of cocurricular activities.
